This week, you are going to create work in order to answer the following question:

As artists, we are learning about the works of a range of artists, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines and making links to their own work.

As historians, we are learning to ask and answer questions about the key parts of a story in history and develop my ideas about the past from pictures.

Creatures, creatures everywhere! How would we classify human beings?

To help you answer the question are key skills which you need to use in your learning this week. As geographers, we are learning to name, locate and identify characteristics of the 4 countries and capital cities of the United Kingdom and its surrounding seas. As scientists, we are learning to label and classify a range of animals including fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals

Art ideas: What other artists focus on living creatures?

- Research artists who use living creatures as a stimulus.
- Create your own living creature sculpture out of recyclable materials.
- Choose an animal print you would like to create. Then use resources such as cardboard, string, leaves etc to create it.
- Choose a different medium e.g. paints to create your own piece of art linked to living creatures.

History ideas: What are key events in the history of the UK?

- Draw, write or use pictures to
- create a timeline of the key events
- in the history of the UK or of the life of a well known artist.
- Research a known British artist from the past and recreate one of their pieces of art in a style of your choosing. Useful links:

Other things you may wish to explore:

- Use photos to create a family tree and research the history of your family.
- Go on a 'creature' hunt outside. Log and categorise the creatures you find. You could even use a bar or tally chart to see which are most common.
- Create a fact file about your favourite creature. Draw and label it too.
- What is your opinion, response to or feelings (red hat thinking) about the sculpture 'Farewell to the Spiderwoman'? Present your ideas, how ever you choose to, to your family.

Science ideas: How can we classify living creatures?

- Create a science glossary to define terms such as: amphibians, reptiles, fish, birds and mammals. Provide examples of these too.
- Create a tree map using pictures/writing/drawings etc. to classify as many different living creatures as you can.
- Create an information poster/leaflet to explain what carnivores, herbivores and omnivores are.
