They've ploughed and fenced the cattle range, But the people there are all so strange.


I'll take my horse, I'll take my rope, And I'll hit the trail upon a lope.

Say 'adios' to the Alamo, And I'll turn my back towards Mexico.


Can I create a multi-layered rhythm composition?

Multi layered rhythms are when more than one type of rhythm is played at the same

time. You need to be able to continue playing your rhythm even when others join in



playing a different rhythm.



How does Native American music use timbre. dynamics, pitch and tempo?

Tempo Pitch D The speed of a piece of music. How high or low a note is. Timbre Dynamics The quality of a musical note that makes the same note sound different when played on different instruments. The variation in volume of the sounds or notes in a piece of music.

Native American music uses mainly untuned percussion wooden instruments such as drums and rattles.

Can I add inter related dimensions to add interest to my composition?

Inter related dimensions are a way of referring to the building blocks of music. To make your composition interesting, can you change the dynamics, tempo or pitch of your song.

Dynamics: — Piano (Quiet) Tempo: Presto Largo — (Quick)

Key Vocabulary

Ostinato: A rhythm that repeats throughout the piece.


Texture: The way different elements of music are layered together.

Rhythm: involves patterns in time—the duration, or length, of musical sounds

Multi layered composition: combining multiple sounds to create more complex and interesting sounds

What is the structure of some Native American music?

Rhythmic structures in Native American music are very complex. There are frequent changes of metre, various lengths and intentional tempo rearrangements between the singers and the drum.
