


Today you are going to apply your knowledge of regular past tense spelling rules as well as your work on expanded noun phrases to write a descriptive piece about the settings you worked on yesterday.



Look at your plan that you created yesterday. Share it with someone else.

Do they think you have used effective and powerful expanded noun phrases to describe the setting? Will it help the reader to visualise the setting? Do your past tense verbs follow the regular past tense spelling rules?





Now boys and girls...as excellent writers, we can't just use adventurous expanded noun phrases and regular past tense verbs correctly spelt in our descriptive paragraphs...we also need to include all the other spelling, punctuation and grammar skills we have acquired over the years. This means, we still need to think about our spellings, using conjunctions to join and link ideas, include a range of sentence types.... So take a deep breathe and watch how I would do this.

verbs ending in a consonant + y	carry → carried
Ψ	study → studied
change y → i + ed	
Some verbs ending in	plan → planned
a single consonant +	stop → stopped
the second last letter is a vowel	- A.
→ double the last letter + ed
