Aims:

- To explain what SATs are, the subjects which are assessed and the way in which they are assessed.
- To confirm when the SATs take place.
- To find out what you need to know to support your child to achieve their very best whilst maintaining their positive wellbeing



What are SATs?

- SATs stands for Standard Assessment Tests.
- KS2 SATs are compulsory for all children in England in year 6 working within the KS2 curriculum (years 3 to 6).
- KS2 SATs will test a child's learning throughout KS2 (years 3 to 6).



Children will sit tests in:

- Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling;
- Reading, and
- Maths

Children will be teacher assessed in:

- Writing, and
- Science



English

Your child will sit three tests in English.

- Grammar, punctuation and spelling (GPS) 45 minutes
- Spelling test 20 minutes
- Reading test 1 hour

Writing is teacher assessed.

All pieces of writing across the year will be used to make a judgement on the skills your child is able to use.

Writing

Your child will **NOT** sit a writing test however all the writing your child produces in class this year is assessed against the teaching standards. This can include writing from across the curriculum.

- We can only use the Teacher Assessment Framework. (TAFs)
- Writing must include <u>all</u> the elements to be assessed at Year 6 standard.



Teacher assessment Framework at the end of Key Stage 2-Writing

Working at the expected standard

The pupil can:

- write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting language that shows good awareness of the reader (e.g. the use of the first person in a diary; direct address in instructions and persuasive writing)
- in narratives, describe settings, characters and atmosphere
- integrate dialogue in narratives to convey character and advance the action
- select vocabulary and grammatical structures that reflect what the writing requires, doing this mostly appropriately (e.g. using contracted forms in dialogues in narrative; using passive verbs to affect how information is presented; using modal verbs to suggest degrees of possibility)
- use a range of devices to build cohesion (e.g. conjunctions, adverbials of time and place, pronouns, synonyms) within and across paragraphs
- · use verb tenses consistently and correctly throughout their writing
- use the range of punctuation taught at key stage 2 mostly correctly[^] (e.g. inverted commas and other punctuation to indicate direct speech)
- spell correctly most words from the year 5 / year 6 spelling list,* and use a dictionary to check the spelling of uncommon or more ambitious vocabulary
- maintain legibility in joined handwriting when writing at speed.²

Working at greater depth

The pupil can:

- write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting the appropriate form and drawing independently on what they have read as models for their own writing (e.g. literary language, characterisation, structure)
- distinguish between the language of speech and writing³ and choose the appropriate register
- exercise an assured and conscious control over levels of formality, particularly through manipulating grammar and vocabulary to achieve this
- use the range of punctuation taught at key stage 2 correctly (e.g. semi-colons, dashes, colons, hyphens) and, when necessary, use such punctuation precisely to enhance meaning and avoid ambiguity.^

[There are no additional statements for spelling or handwriting]






Your child will sit three tests in Maths.


- ❖ Paper 1: Arithmetic 30 minutes

- Paper 3: Reasoning 40 minutes

























Each shape stands for a number.


Examples of questions from the reasoning past papers.
















Science

Your child will **NOT** sit a science test however all the science knowledge your child has gained from year 3 to 6 will be collated, and one science assessment will be reported to parents.



Key dates

KS2 SATs will take place on May 13^{th} – May 16^{th} 2024

Date	SAT paper
Mon 13 th May	GPS: Paper 1 (GPS written paper - 45 minutes) GPS: Paper 2 (Spelling paper - 20 minutes)
Tues 14 th May	Reading Test (1 hour)
Weds 15 th May	Math: Paper 1 (Arithmetic - 30 minutes) Maths: Paper 2 (Reasoning paper 1 - 40 minutes)
Thurs 16 th May	Maths: Paper 3 (Reasoning paper 2 - 40 minutes)



How will the results be reported?

Subject	How will it be reported?
GPS	Both papers will be added together and you will receive a scaled score based on the test alone.
Reading	You will receive a scaled score based on the test alone.
Maths	All 3 papers will be added together and you will receive a scaled score based on the test alone.
Writing	You will receive one reported assessment based on teacher assessment.
Science	You will receive one reported assessment based on teacher assessment.



How will the results be reported?

Each child is given a scaled score as a number.

This is based on their raw score – the number of marks they receive in a test.

- Children may achieve a score of:
 - Below 100, meaning they have not achieved the 'expected standard'
 - 100, meaning that they have reached the 'expected standard'
 - Above 100, meaning that they have exceeded the 'expected standard'
- * A child who reaches the expected standard (100 or above) is considered to be ready for the next stage of their education.

SATs can form different emotions in every child. Some children absolutely love tests and thrive in them, others become anxious and worried.

For some children this will be their first experience of a formal test and formal test conditions.

We will do everything we can to support your child through this time.

Things we do to support your child:

- Children are exposed to SAT style questions within their lessons and are taught how their knowledge can help them answer them.
- Children will be given the opportunity to practice a past paper in test conditions.
- Children are encouraged to revisit and revise skills they have been taught.
- Children work in small groups where appropriate to ensure skills are secure.

All of these will help build their confidence and enables to see the style of questions they could be asked.

- Children are encouraged to discuss their emotions regularly and are given strategies to support them.
- We try not to mention SATs too often as it is only one week out of their year 6 life.
- We are a caring, collaborative community.



Things we do to support your child during the week:

- All children will be invited in for a toast breakfast each morning of the tests.
- Children will sit their SATs in different sized groups depending on their need.
- All equipment is provided for them so they don't need to worry about forgetting anything.
- Children will be given juice and a biscuit after each test paper.
- Children will have longer break times during SATs week.
- SATs is seen as 'show off week'.



What can you do to support your child throughout the term:

- Keep them positive and encourage them. Think about what they can do, not what they can't.
- Help them with revision. Revision is best in short burst and then a break (no more than 20 mins at a time) but please do not practice SAT papers from the years 2019, 2022 or 2023 as these will be used as mock papers within school.
- Ensure they read regularly and practice TTRS.
- Ensure they have some relaxed time where they do something they enjoy (but maybe something that isn't too dangerous as we don't want any broken bones!)
- Have a calm & relaxed approach. Have conversations with your child and let us know if they are worried.
- Ensure your child attends school everyday from now on as this will support your child to feel confident and not have gaps in their understanding.



What can you do to support your child in the week of SATs:

- Make sure they get a good night's sleep especially the weekend before SATs week.
- Make sure they eat well as this will help them concentrate in school.
- Do not book any appointments for this week for your child.
- Ensure they come to school on time.
- Plan some lovely calming activities and things that they enjoy (but again something that isn't too dangerous as we don't want any broken bones!)
